

The Preamble

The Preamble is the introductory sentence of the United States Constitution. Like all important documents it has been revised. Compare the original to the final draft and think about the changes that were made.

Original Draft:

We the People of the States of New-Hampshire, Massachusetts, Rhode-Island and Providence Plantations, Connecticut, New-York, New-Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, North-Carolina, South-Carolina, and Georgia, do ordain, declare and establish the following Constitution for the Government of Ourselves and our Posterity.

Final Draft:

We the People of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

2. What is in the final draft that is not in the original draft? What do you think this was added?

3. Which version seems better to you? Why?
